
The Riddle of the **MONSTER**

- ⁶ "That's easy," said Oedipus. "The answer is *man.* A man crawls on all fours when he's a baby. He stands up on two legs when he's grown. And when he's old he leans on a cane—and that's like a third leg."
- 7 This was the right answer. The Sphinx was very angry. She was so angry that she jumped off a cliff and was killed.
- 8 Now it was safe to pass the rock. The people of Thebes were so glad that they made Oedipus their king.
