
- "In sixteen hundred and sixty-six London burned like rotten sticks."
- 2 In 1666 there was a big fire in London. It is always called "the Great Fire." It was one of the worst fires ever.
- The Great Fire lasted three days. It swept across London. It burned houses. It burned churches. It burned all the buildings in its path. Not many lives were lost. But London had to be rebuilt.
- A man named Christopher Wren helped rebuild London. Many of his buildings are still standing. They are some of the finest buildings in the world.
- 5 Christopher Wren started with St. Paul's Cathedral. This had been a fine old church, but it had been ruined by the fire. Wren set out to rebuild it.
- First he drew a picture. It showed how he would make the new church look. He took the picture to the men who governed London. But they didn't like it. So he drew another. They didn't like that one either.

So Wren went on drawing. He kept at it for years! At last he drew a picture that the men liked. "That's

- good," they said. "The new St. Paul's can look like that."
- Wren was surprised. This picture was almost like his first one!
- Wren began to build. Many years passed before he was through. There were problems. Sometimes the money would run out. The men who governed London kept changing their minds. Wren had to keep changing his plans to suit them.
- 10 At last St. Paul's was done. It was a beautiful church. It still is. People come from all over the world to see it.
- other churches. He built more than fifty in London. The king of England liked Wren's work. He made Wren a knight. Now people called him *Sir* Christopher Wren. When Christopher Wren died, he was buried in St. Paul's Cathedral.

Sir Christopher Wren was one of England's great builders. The English people treasure his memory. It would be hard for them to forget him. The spires of his many churches reach into the sky above London.
