
## Trading Places

- <sup>5</sup> "Enough!" she cried. "Tomorrow I'll tend to the field, and you can relax doing my chores."
- 6 "Wonderful!" replied Sean. "Now you'll appreciate how hard I work."
- 7 The next morning as she made pancakes, Fiona told Sean what he needed to do.
- 8 "Mop the floor, collect the eggs, feed the pig, let the cow out to graze, and cook the soup."
- <sup>9</sup> Then, Fiona set off for the field, leaving her husband in charge of the house.
- "Well," Sean said merrily, "I guess I'll gather the eggs first." Off he strolled to the henhouse. He had collected only a dozen eggs when the pig began squealing.
- <sup>11</sup> "Better feed the pig," Sean muttered. As he turned, he tripped over one of the chickens. The eggs flew from his arms and soared through the open door into the house, landing with twelve big "SPLATS" on the floor.
- <sup>12</sup> Sean stormed over to the pigpen, yanked open the gate, and scolded, "Look what you made me do, Pig. Go find your own breakfast!"
- <sup>13</sup> Well, that's exactly what the pig did. Out of the pen Pig darted, heading for the open door. He dashed between Sean's legs, sending the farmer toppling headfirst into the mud. By the time Sean got back inside, the pig had eaten all the pancakes and was sniffing around for more.
- <sup>14</sup> "Get out of my kitchen!" Sean yelled, running toward the pig. But Sean forgot about the broken eggs and went slipping and sliding across the floor. He landed right on top of the mop, breaking its handle.

- <sup>15</sup> "Oh no!" cried Sean, examining the dirty floor. "How am I going to clean up this mess now?" He realized it was getting late, and he hadn't finished a single chore!
- <sup>16</sup> He thought for a moment. "If I take the cow out to graze in the pasture now, I won't have time to cook the soup. But if I cook the soup, I won't have time to take the cow out to graze."
- <sup>17</sup> Suddenly, Sean remembered that the roof had grass growing on it because his house was built into the side of a hill.
